Explorer	Short trips to points of interest in the neighborhood or community, like a walk to a nearby park, a short ride by car to a firehouse, courthouse or nearby store for an activity. Day Tripper	All-day visit to a point of historical or natural interest in a nearby city or travel to a location specific to a Journey requirement. Overnighter	One or two nights away to a nearby city, museum overnight or camp. Weekender	Two to four nights over 300 miles away. Girls are able to assist with reserving accommodations and finding transportation options, including pricing and scheduling. Traveler	Travel anywhere in the country, often lasting a week or more, is considered a Traveler trip. Planning of the trip usually takes 12-24 months. Try to steer clear of trips girls might take with their families and consider trips that offer some educational component.
